

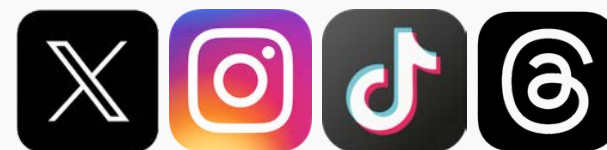

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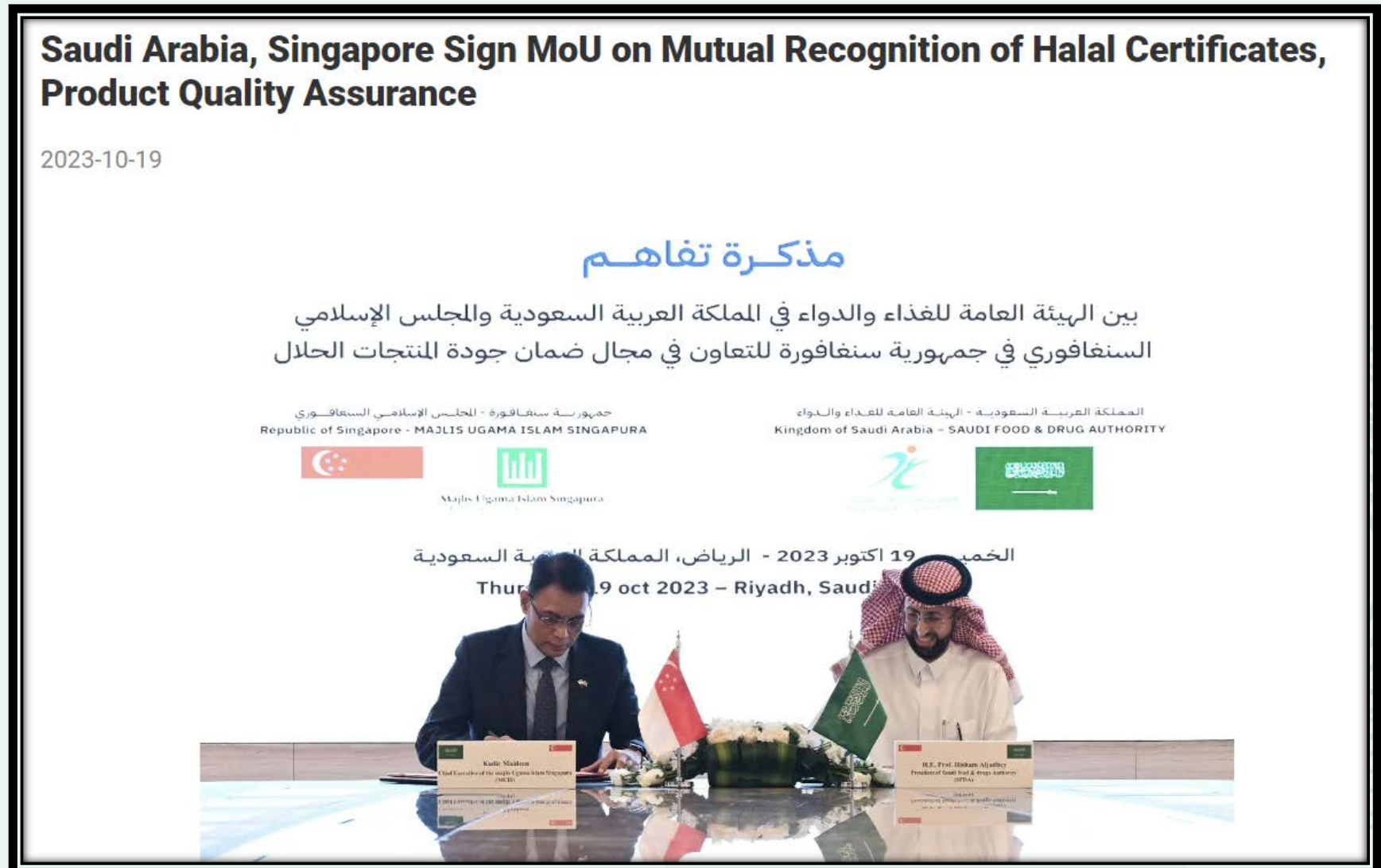

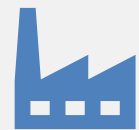

Trade Facilitation of Halal Food Products

- Muis has certified **96 Foreign Halal Certification Bodies (FHCB)**
- Muis pursues Halal MOU/MRA with identified key markets to enhance our local businesses' export interests
- In October 2023, Muis signed MOUs with Saudi Food & Drug Authority (SFDA) and UAE's Ministry of Industry and Advanced Technology (MoIAT) which facilitate trading of halal-certified products between Singapore and each respective country



Export Policy on Non-Consumables



Growing trend towards halal certification of non-consumables globally.



Indonesia has made halal certification of non-consumables mandatory with passing of **Indonesia Halal Law No. 33 in 2014**. The law will be made effective in phases from October 2024 onwards.



Singapore companies would require their non-consumable products to be halal certified for their exports to such markets.



Muis is reviewing its procedures to facilitate halal certification of non-consumable products for export to such markets

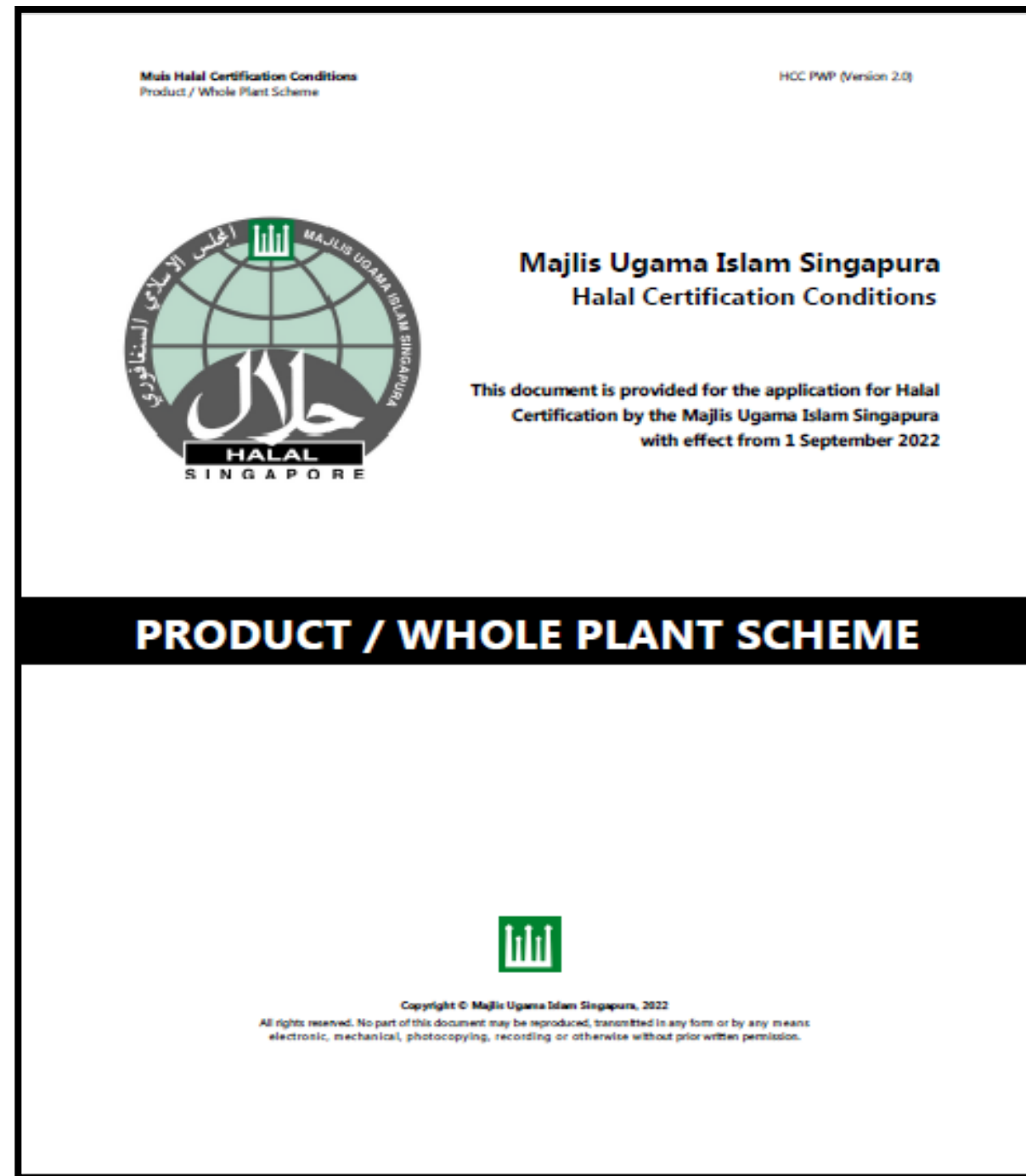

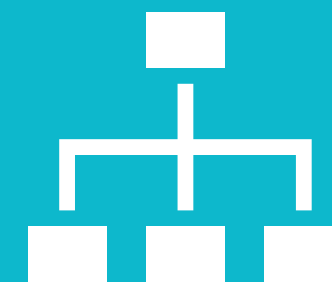

Blackout period after application rejection or certificate revocation

“Blackout Period”

- The premises **will not be able to submit a new application for at least 90 days** after application rejection or certificate revocation.
- Any new application submitted during this period will be **automatically rejected**.
- Any payment made for the application is **non-refundable**.

Research & Development

Applicants who intend to conduct research and development (R&D) within the premises shall comply with the following:

- (a) Submit a letter of undertaking to Muis via email.
- (b) Submit list of high-risk R&D ingredients with supporting documents to Muis via email. Approval must be obtained first.
- (c) Store R&D ingredients in a dedicated area clearly marked with appropriate signage.
- (d) Maintain the following documents and records:
 - i. Updated list of R&D ingredients, and its supporting documents
 - ii. Original invoices and delivery orders that clearly indicate the ingredients used for R&D
 - iii. Records of R&D production

Additional Conditions for Marketing

The applicant must ensure that all advertising, signboards, and corporate materials (such as business cards and invoices) shall not:

- mislead on the Halal status of the establishment, menu items and products sold **including any collaborations with non Halal-certified business entities**;
- make false claims that premises beyond the scope of certification are Halal-certified;
- resemble those belonging to non Halal-certified businesses, including logos **and uniforms**; and
- **include elements that may offend or be insensitive towards any race or religion.**

4 Ingredients Risk Categorisation

Types of Halal Risk	Low	Medium-Low	Medium - High	High
Definitions	Primarily derived from non-animal sources, which are unprocessed or minimally processed	Primarily derived from non-animal sources that go through further processing without any animal-based additives	Have been highly processed, may involve fermentation or have animal-derived substances added	Contain flavouring, gelatine or meat and its derivatives

Exports to Indonesia

- At present, the certification body “Majelis Ulama Indonesia (MUI) or Indonesian Council of Ulama” is the only Muis recognised FHCB from Indonesia.
- New Indonesian government agency called Badan Penyelenggara Jaminan Produk Halal - BPJPH had been recently formed.
- A mutual recognition agreement (MRA) with BPJPH to continue facilitating the export of halal-certified products to/from both countries is still in progress.
- Muis will continue recognising products certified by MUI and BPJPH for use at Muis-certified establishments.



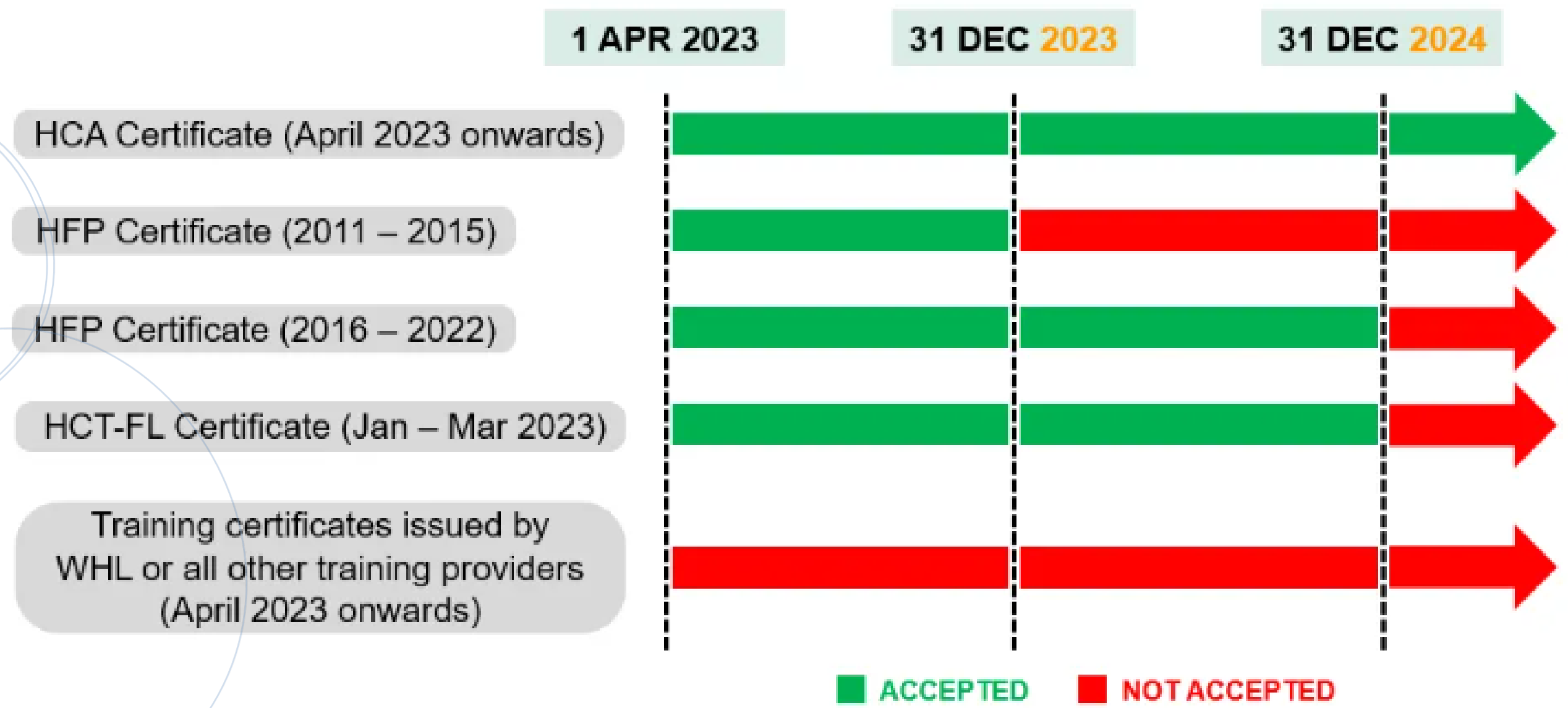

Halal Competency Assessment (HCA)

- Launched in April 2023
- HCA is an assessment to **recognise individuals' Halal competency** as part of the **requirement for Muis Halal Certification**.
- Mandatory for Halal Team Leader and one Halal Assurance Officer

Product and Whole Plant Scheme

	Product	Whole Plant
Scheme Eligibility	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Applicable to <u>selected products</u>, which are manufactured or partly processed / packed in Singapore, meant for retail sale. <p><u>Not Applicable to :</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">Trading items manufactured outside the applicant's premises;Products that are manufactured overseas without any further processing in Singapore;Food products packed in non-retail containers for use locally (i.e for supply to food manufacturers or food services for further use), unless primary trade of manufacturer is manufacturing;Manufacturing facility that has a valid Halal certificate under the Whole Plant scheme, which is not due for renewal.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Applicable to manufacturing facility, including <u>all products</u> manufactured therein, in Singapore. <p><u>Not Applicable to :</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">Manufacturing facility operating outside Singapore;Poultry abattoir certified under Poultry scheme;Food products packed in non-retail containers for use locally (i.e. for supply to food manufacturers or food services for further use), unless primary trade of manufacturer is manufacturing;Manufacturing facility that has a valid Halal certificate under the Product scheme, which is not due for renewal;Brand owners who solely contract-manufacture products;Manufacturing facility that solely manufacture products for brand owners;Flavour houses.

Requirements for Contract-Manufactured Products

Who shall be the Halal applicant?

Scenario A

If the product packaging bears the details of both brand owner and contract manufacturer, either the contract manufacturer or brand owner shall be the applicant.

Scenario B

If the product packaging bears the details of brand owner only, the brand owner shall be the applicant.

Declaration of Ingredients

Muis HCC Clause 3.4

Declaration of ingredients shall be done during the application. Details of ingredients' declaration shall include:

For meat and meat-based (including poultry) items

- (a) item name, **brand** and/or description
- (b) name of supplier (as reflected on invoice)
- (c) **name of Halal certification body**

For all other items

- (a) item name and/or description
- (b) name of supplier (as reflected on invoice)

Declaration of Products

Muis HCC Clause 2.8

Declaration of products to be certified by Muis shall include:

- (a) **Exact** names printed on the packaging;
- (b) Product description (if product name does not reflect nature of product);
- (c) Brand name (if any);
- (d) Product code (if any);
- (e) Artwork of product packaging.

Naming of products to be certified shall take into account cultural and religious sensitivities, and may be subject to change if Muis deems that the product name is inappropriate.

Similar products bearing different brand names and/or product descriptions shall be treated as separate products.

Labelling of Products

The applicant shall ensure that all ingredients and products are labelled in **English**, minimally with the following information for **traceability** purpose:

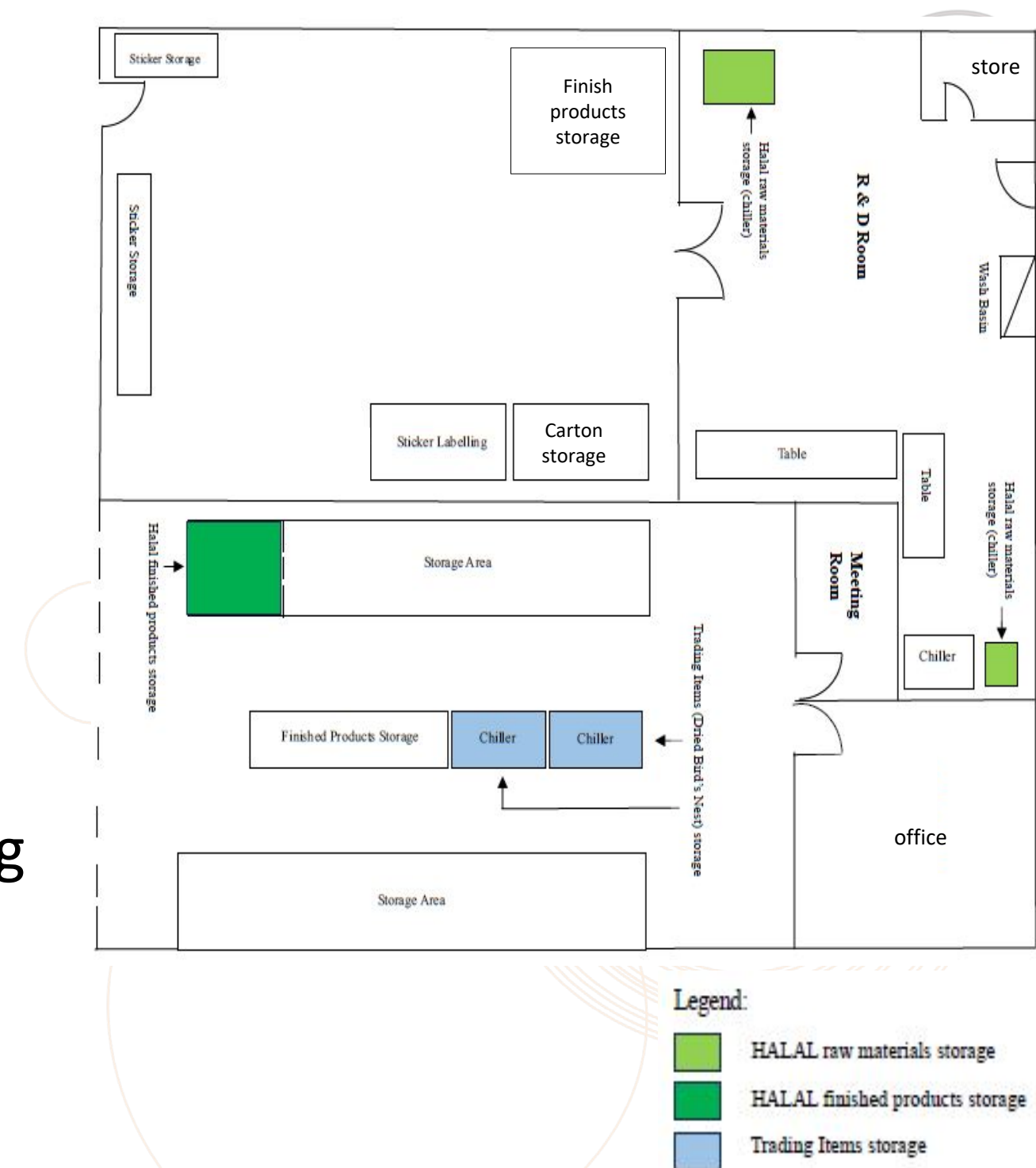
- (a) product name and description,
- (b) manufacturer/brand owner's name;
- (c) manufacturer/brand owner's address;
- (d) abattoir / plant number*;
- (e) Halal slaughtering and packing date*;
- (f) Halal mark or equivalent*.

*Only for high-risk items such as imported meat / poultry.

Muis may also consider alternative documents to determine the traceability of a Halal certificate / documents to an ingredient / raw material.

Preparing for a Halal Certification Audit

- **Halal File:**
 - Relevant license(s) e.g. SFA / NEA
 - Floorplan (labeled, includes floor size details)
 - Raw materials supporting documents e.g. Halal Certificates, Halal Questionnaires, etc
 - HalMQ Plan & Records
 - Halal Team Appointment letters
 - Training records, etc.
 - Invoices (minimally past 3-6 months records)
 - Product Packaging
- **Halal Team (Leader and members)** to be present during opening and closing meetings
- **Conducive venue** to conduct the opening and closing meetings



Preparing for a Halal Certification Audit

Other documentation to be furnished during the audit :

- Internal audit records
- Past Management Review Meeting minutes
- List of Brand Owners – especially those applying for halal
- Trading items list
- Others: Letter of explanation/declaration e.g. R&D, Waiver against Muis HCC – ensure correct version of HCC, clause quoted, and efforts taken is justifiable.



Criteria for 2-year Certification

1. Level of Commitment

- Good records/documents keeping
- Adequate and proper controls and processes are in place to ensure halal compliance

2. Competency of halal team

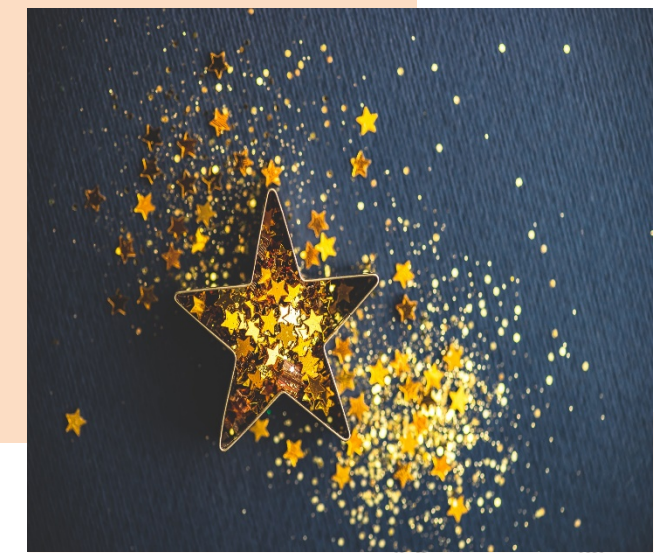
- HCA Completion
- Entire halal team demonstrates knowledge & shows commitment to ensure compliance

3. Compliance history

- No Enforcement/Suspension records
- No public feedback
- No misuse of Muis Halal Certification Mark online and offline (e.g. social media, invoices, etc)

Best Practices

- ✓ Formation of a **multidisciplinary, competent** Halal team
- ✓ Halal Team is **not dependent** on a single person or any external parties
- ✓ Halal Team **conducts internal audits** to continuously identify halal gaps
- ✓ Halal Team develops, implements and maintains **good record-keeping and tracking systems** (e.g. development and implementation of a tracking mechanism for the sourcing and procurement of raw materials capturing information such as supplier address, manufacturer address, halal cert expiry etc.)
- ✓ Matters related to the RFA (Request For Action) are clarified with the Muis officer on-site during the closing meeting, to minimize the need for clarification post-audit



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
